The certificates that were presented each had an embossed NSSAR Crest with signatures by the respective presidents and secretaries.

Born on July 26, 1901 near The Rome Chapter, Georgia Society Sons Choestoe, Compatriot Dyer served in the Pacific theater. The Bushnell was a submarine tender - a repair and photographer and was the oldest enlisted man on board. This distinction was the source of his nickname – "Pappy".

The NSSAR Headquarters staff has put forth additional effort this year to process its backlog of applications. To update Georgia members on the application review timeline, new member applications are now being processed with a 60 day turnaround and supplemental applications with a nine month turnaround. They have really done an outstanding job handling this additional workload.

There is a posthumous membership, called the Memorial Membership, that allows deceased persons to become memorial

members of the SAR. The fee is \$60.00 plus a one time payment of \$250.00. The lineage must be a person who is two generations or less removed from a DAR or SAR (grandfather, father, uncle). The regular application procedures apply for this type of membership.

If you have ordered a DAR record copy recently, you have noticed that the DAR is not including the front page of an application. They instead have replaced it with a cover sheet to protect the privacy of the DAR member. If you are submitting a DAR Record Copy of this type, please send with the record copy the cover letter from DAR which includes the name of the DAR applicant and the national number of the record copy.

Many of you know Mrs. Betty Graham who has served as NSSAR Administrative Genealogist. She has decided to leave NSSAR. The Georgia Society wishes her well in her future pursuits and thanks her for many years of service and diligence at maintaining the integrity of our application process and data!

The Georgians were present at Kings Mountain once again. A total of 23 GASSAR Color Guardsmen mustered - nearly 4/5ths of the requested 30 - to honor the memory of not only all the patriots that fought and died 224 years ago, but to specifically honor the memory of the 30 Georgians that history has largely forgotten.

The most notable wreath laid was the one presented by Compatriot Robert Galer, Chairman of the Georgia Historic Sites and Celebrations Committee. It was placed in honor of the 30 Forgotten Georgians who fought alongside the Overmountain Men. As this wreath was presented, members of the militia honor guard gave a resounding "Huzzah." # The Siege of Savannah

After two days at Kings Mountain, representatives of the Sons of the American Revolution headed South to celebrate the 225th anniversary of the Siege of Savannah, the second bloodiest battle of the Revolution second only to Bunker Hill in terms of casualties.

The main event for the SAR was the presentation of NSSAR, GASSAR, Altamaha Chapter, and Marshes of Glynn Chapter wreaths on Saturday, October 9, 2004, at the Battle of Savannah commemoration ceremony at Battlefield Park.

At 0730 hours Saturday morning, the GASSAR Color Guard of Commander Paul Prescott, Richard Ramsaur and Bob Galer escorted dozens of dignitaries and spectators to the Louisville Road to be greeted by the wail of a lone bagpiper, and the beat of drums from the British position.

Allied and British forces, in authentic reenactor costume, were lined up at opposite ends of the battlefield for a solemn ceremony. Ragged volleys were fired representing significant moments in the battle. Allied reenactors marched silently up the slope to the site of the Spring Hill Redoubt to recreate the steps of the Allied attackers advancing on the British-held city. The defenders responded with marches and counter-marches, volleys and cannon fire. SAR Brett Osborn of Marquis de LaFayette Chapter, could be observed firing as the Allied reenactors rent the air with successive volleys.

Both Allied and British units froze in place when Announcer **Scott Smith,** Executive

Director of the Coastal Heritage Society, called for the SAR to lay wreaths squarely between the opposing sides. Representing the NSSAR President General, Bob Galer, Chairman of GASSAR Historic Sites and Celebrations committee, took the NSSAR wreath to the center of the field. David Dukes, Regional Vice President presenting the GASSAR wreath for the President and the Altamaha Chapter wreath, followed him (photo below). Bill Ramsaur, President of Marshes of Glynn SAR Chapter laid his Chapter wreath.

Three successive, and very loud, volleys were then fired by each force to honor the



memory of those who died at the Siege. Count d'Estaing (reenactor) invited the GASSAR Honor Guard, wreath presenters and spectators to join the troops in a hearty three "Huzzahs". This was carried out with gusto.

The ceremony concluded with the Georgia Society Color Guard following the Allied and British reenactors as they formed up and marched off the field into the city.

## Pulaski Jubilee

Members of the Georgia Society SAR helped to commemorate the heroic death of the Casimir Pulaski at the Franco-American attack on Savannah in October 1779. They were joined by former President General **Stewart McCarty** (1994-95), representing the National Society.

The Pulaski Jubilee began in 2001 with its final year being 2005 by which time, the Savannah Pulaski committee and Polish-Americans everywhere hope that DNA testing will confirm that the bones found interred in an iron box within the Pulaski Monument in 1996 are those of the Polish Revolutionary hero. A special wooden casket was constructed in Poland and sent to Savannah in anticipation of favorable test results.

President General McCarty and **David B. Dukes, Sr.,** GASSAR Southeast Regional Vice
President attended the Cathedral service for the
blessing of the casket. After the blessing, they
processed to the site where General Pulaski was
mortally wounded by British cannon fire. After
the Polish contingent placed a memorial wreath
and the playing of Taps the solemn procession
then moved out to Monterey Square.

The S.A.R. Color Guard took position on the left of the monument and behind the speaker's podium, with a U.S. Army Color Guard to the right. Participating members of the Georgia Color Guard were Acting-Commander Paul Prescott, Piedmont Chapter; Brett Osborn, Marquis de Lafayette Chapter; George Wheeless, Casimir Pulaski Chapter; Rhett Williamson, Button Gwinnett Chapter and Richard Ramsaur, Joseph Habersham Chapter.

After music, speeches and the recognition of guests, a representative laid a wreath at the foot

of the monument for the Polish Embassy. President General Stewart McCarty then presented the NSSAR wreath on behalf of President General Hank McCarl. Georgia Society Regional Vice Presidents David B. Dukes, Sr. and W. Manning "Dutch" **Dreyer** with the Georgia Society and Casimir Pulaski Chapter wreaths followed him, respectively. Wreaths followed for the Altamaha Chapter and Marshes of Glynn Chapters of GASSAR, the American Council for Polish Culture, the City of Savannah and the Haitian-American Society. Joining in the program at Monterey Square were Bob Galer and William Ramsaur, President of the Marshes of Glynn Chapter. A banquet hosted by the Polish Embassy and City of Savannah was the concluding event in the two-day Pulaski Jubilee. Twenty-five Meritorious Service Medals and Certificates were announced at the banquet—called the Brigadier General Pulaski Captain Alexander O'Neil Medal. > The Georgia Historical Marker, entitled "The Georgia Navy," includes the following text: "During the American Revolution four heavily-armed row galleys were constructed in Savannah for the Georgia Navy, all underwritten by the Continental Congress. In nearby Frederica River, beginning at dawn on April 19, 1778, Georgia galleys Lee, Washington, and Bulloch, commanded by Colonel Samuel Elbert, attacked HM brigantine Hinchinbrook, the armed sloop Rebecca, and an armed watering brig. The British attempted to retaliate, but were out-gunned and outmaneuvered. As they tried to gain an advantage by moving down river their ships grounded, were abandoned, and captured. remarkable victory boosted patriot morale and delayed by more than eight months the British invasion of Georgia."
