President General J. Michael Tomme, Sr. Inaugural Remarks

126th Annual Congress of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution

Westin Copley Hotel · Boston, MA · 13 July, 2016

Golden Opportunities for the Future of the SAR "Where the past embraces the future".

Compatriots, distinguished guests, and ladies. What an honor and a privilege it is to stand before you this evening as your 113th President General of the National Society Sons of the American Revolution. I am humbled and I appreciate the confidence that you have bestowed upon me, by electing me to this position. I am excited to serve you and this worthy organization.

First, I want to thank PG Tom Lawrence for a great year and wonderful 126th Congress.

At this time, allow me to take a couple of minutes to introduce members of my family:

My wife, Cilla Leed and your First Lady.

Our son, John M. Tomme, Jr., and his wife Jenny.

Our two daughters, Leslie and Laura (whom are not in attendance due to work schedules) and our five grandchildren are all at home in Georgia. My Dad, at age 88, is unable to attend due to his current medical conditions. I want thank each of my family members for supporting me in this journey.

I also want recognize my Georgia SAR "family" as these are the individuals who first introduced me to the SAR. Will the members of the Georgia Society please stand, and be recognized?

I take great pride in that I am a member of the SAR. This is your society and each of us has an important role to play. We should take every opportunity to educate the public on who we are and why we are relevant. I believe we can increase our identity and have the SAR become more recognizable to the public. Over the years, a lot of our compatriots and colleagues have worked hard to make this organization into the largest, strongest and best society that it can be. However, there is still a lot of work to do, both now and into our future.

At the Spring Leadership and Trustees meeting, we took an important step into the future. We engaged in discernment and debate of the proposal, and then the Trustees voted to pay the final installment of the interpretive plan to Solid Light and approved moving ahead with the Educational Outreach Center, when we have the money in hand. I believe that our compatriots like our Patriot ancestors, came away from this session with an overall appreciation of the process and agreed to move forward.

This facility will be a wonderful addition to our Society not only now, but into the future of our organization once it is completed. With our headquarters located on Main Street, among numerous museums and tourist attractions, this Educational Outreach Center once completed will not only enhance our visibility, but should attract new prospective members who visit the area. Visitors could tour our Educational Center and then exit next door to our library to conduct research on their own family history.

I will continue the Implementation Committee that PG Lawrence started. This will be chaired by PG Nathan White. This committee will continue to be made up of stakeholders from the following committees: SAR Foundation, IT, Education, Budget, Finance, and Strategic Planning Committees. They will continue to review our existing plans, programs and needs as we progress into the future and continue to prioritize them. The Committee will continue to set forth and present to the ExCom and Trustees a list of priorities.

I am also continuing the following committees and programs, which were in place before I was elected:

Compatriot Doug Collins will continue as chair the Patriot Ancestors' Biographies.

PG Brock will chair SAR Medal of Honor Recipients and work to finish this project.

Compatriot Chuck Sweeney will chair the Veterans Recognition Committee.

Compatriot Paul Callanan will chair the Congress Review Committee.

Compatriot Dr. Rudy Byrd will chair the Council of Youth Awards.

Compatriot John Dodd will chair the Governance and Organization Committee.

An important part of SAR mission is <u>patriotic education</u> and therefore it is our responsibility to share our knowledge of the founding of this country and the struggles of our forefathers and ancestors. That is why my first initiative is <u>Education Outreach</u>. To enhance our Educational Outreach beyond the borders of Louisville, KY, this new Educational Outreach Team initiative will extend this mission into our chapters and reach out to the children in their schools, scout organizations, civil groups, religious institutions, and other patriotic societies.

The long range goal of this initiative is to develop and share educational program presentations by SAR members. These presentations would be <u>Colonial Living History</u> (era before or during the American Revolution), a discussion about or founding documents, presentations on battles or personalities, or other appropriate patriotic programs targeted for children. <u>The long term goal is to have a NSSAR data base of all Educational Outreach Teams and their programs</u>. This would allow educators a data base of our nationwide programs including contact information and scripts and/or videos. Colleen Wilson, NSSAR Education Director; Brooks Lyles, Educational Committee Chairman; Bill Stone, Educational Outreach Center Production Chair; and Tom Jackson, Web-based Educational Learning Subcommittee Chair, and others on the NSSAR Educational Team will work together to develop this initiative. The NSSAR Educational Director could assist in the developing of new presentations.

The details of this long range initiative can found on the NSSAR website. There will be two levels of the program, (1) for those chapters who have <u>never offered</u> an educational outreach program and (2) for those chapters who <u>already</u> have an educational program in place. The basic requirements are the same and will require chapters to share their program information with NSSAR to be included in the national education website. Streamers will be available for those chapters who complete this initiative between now and 31 May 2017. But this initiative does not stop in 2017. It continues for many years into the future.

My next initiative is the Mentor Program.

When does the mentor process begin? It begins when a new prospective member inquires/seeks information on becoming a member of the Sons of the American Revolution by a casual conversation, email inquiry, or responding to an ad in local paper. At that time, the process should be an offer to assist or a referral to a mentor in the chapter. The President should have a list of mentors in the chapter to assist in this endeavor. Each chapter should have mentors regardless of the size of the chapter. The mentor should assist the applicant through the process of acceptance and continue on once he becomes a member <u>to assimilate the new member ensuring a meaningful relationship with the current members and a commitment to the mission of the society.</u>

It has been recognized that the retention rate of members, especially new members should be increased. I believe the retention rate may be significantly increased by involving a new member in the activities of the chapter, state and national level through "mentoring" of new members. The mentoring of members is a responsibility of all SAR members and especially the 1st line sponsor and chapter.

Therefore, I am asking the *Membership Committee* to spear head this project. I am requesting that they review their policies, pamphlets and brochures and bring them up to date. Their publications should be "eye catching" to the public. I would charge the Membership Committee to work with the Medals and Awards Committee to look into the possibility of tying a portion of this program to the Liberty Medal. The goal of this initiative is to create an effective mentorship program which will enhance not only our enrollment numbers, but the quality and quantity of our SAR programs.

Our Youth programs continue to be strong. We continue to have strong leadership in these committees. Our Council of Youth Awards has put together a wonderful brochure listing all of Youth Awards. I am aware that additional money is required to increase the awards provided by the various programs. Therefore, I am issuing a <u>challenge</u> to each <u>State Society</u> to donate \$1,000 or more to the Council of Youth Awards <u>(not to the individual youth programs)</u> between now and 1 June 2017. Those states that meet the \$1,000 challenge will receive a streamer. If <u>100% of</u> <u>the state societies</u> donate \$1,000, Cilla and I will donate \$10,000 or more to the Council of Youth Awards. The total donations would then be divided amount the various programs. I would charge the Committee to look at the various programs and determine how to equalize the awards.

Our NSSAR CAR program continues to grow. I am asking Chairman Darrin Schmidt to make sure that each State Society has a State CAR Chairman. I would like the State CAR Chairman to *encourage* each chapter to create a CAR Liaison. Chapters should encourage SAR members to become Senior Leaders in the local and state CAR societies, as well as at the National level. I would like each SAR chapter to enroll CAR members as Junior Members in our society. Once they become SAR Junior Members, the chapters are *encouraged* to get them involved in our committees. Many of the CAR members are already serving on committees in the CAR, why not with the SAR? This would increase our membership. Once the Junior Member ages out, they would continue on into the parent organization.

This year the National Park Service is celebrating its 100th year of service. This is wonderful opportunity for the *Historic Site and Celebrations Committee* to build our relationship with the Park Service and partner with them in their year of celebration. The Park Service is engaging in a campaign to reintroduce the national parks and the work of the National Park Service to a new generation of Americans. Therefore, I am issuing a *challenge* to the Historic Site and Celebrations Committee to build upon our relationship with the National Park Service. Many of our American Revolutionary historic sites our maintained by the Park Service and with our increased involvement, this would bring increased visibility and promotion of the SAR to a potential new member base.

In closing, I would like reflect on the exceptional members we have in the SAR. We have all given of our time, talents and financial assets to make this organization prominent. Now is our opportunity to take the SAR to a new level and commitment. We must continue to promote the SAR to the public, so that we are recognizable. We must constantly tell our ancestor's stories and those of the early patriots who fought for our independence. We live in the greatest country and enjoy the freedoms that our forefathers fought for over 230 years ago. We are obligated to continue to preserve our heritage, our mission, and the historic principals for which this country was founded upon.

I ask that you please keep Cilla and me in your thoughts and prayers as we travel this great nation, to carry out the business of our society. We both look forward to a wonderful year. Thank you once again for the confidence you have placed in me. I look forward to working alongside you for our Society, a society of gentlemen, the Sons of the American Revolution.





My objective is to get needed information into the hands of the Senior Military Instructor (SMI) to assist them with our SAR JROTC Awards Programs.

Every JROTC Unit in the Georgia Society SAR area should know by name the SAR Chapter that supports them. Additionally the JROTC Unit should have a Chapter POC (Point of Contact) name, phone numbers and email addresses for that compatriot and his assistant. Now is the time to affect liaison with the SMI or SEI for all the JROTC Units in your Chapter AO (Area of Operations).

SMI's should be working on their Outstanding Cadet (OC) Nomination for the JROTC Enhanced Program. One cannot put together an OC Nomination Package in a few days or a week. Ask the SMI to use the information I provided as a Check List. Remember the Chapter Winner OC Nomination Package to me has a Deadline of **NLT Friday 2 December 2016.** Send me the package in late October or early November and I'll look it over and give the SMI a chance to correct or revise any problem detected.

Several chapters have Sea Cadet Units and I have addresses the SAR Award (BGCM) and Sea Cadet Ribbon.

SAR does not have an awards or recognition program for (Youth) Civil Air Patrol Cadets (CAP). A chapter may be contacted by a CAP Unit about an award for one of their outstanding cadets. If the Commanding Officer of the Unit provides sufficient justification for an award, the chapter could opt to award the BGCM to that Outstanding CAP Cadet.

The GASSAR Public Relations committee is composed of John Trussell, Chairman, (Ocmulgee Chapter President), Ray Crumbley (Past Pres, Ocmulgee Chapter) Jack Russell (Ocmulgee member) Wayne Brown, GASSAR VP, and Ashley Russell Rubin and Billie Trussell (Dar members) and is charged with spreading the good word and works about the SAR across our great state. We are currently soliciting new members, so if you have a desire to help in our efforts, please contact John Trussell at <u>jtrusswr@cox.net</u>.

Two items that we are currently working on are 1) developing a power point presentation that can be used by any Georgia SAR or DAR Chapter for public education and new member recruitment. If your chapter has already developed an PR outreach program, we would appreciate you sharing it with us. Ed Rigel has already shared a great program with us. The power point will focus on the great works accomplished by SAR and DAR and how our organizations serve our local communities. It will also briefly review the Revolutionary War in Georgia and the south and some of the important battles leading to our independence. It will briefly discuss finding your patriot ancestor, exploring your roots through DNA testing and documenting your family history. It will cover the many programs we sponsor to educate and build character in our youth, so they can be better citizens. Lastly, It will briefly discuss keeping America strong by honoring our military, supporting our governmental agencies, taking an active role in government by being informed on the issues, voting at every opportunity and joining the SAR or DAR!

The other item 2) that we are looking at is developing a brief new member profile that will be on our website, so that potential members can share basic info with us by email to expedite their inquiry into potential membership. This is already being used by several other SAR state organizations, like Tennessee.

GA SAR President Allen Greenly recently stated that two of his goals for 2016 were to increased the public's awareness of GA SAR and to increase membership. To obtain those goals it will take the effort and commitment of all of our 33 chapters and it will be a work in progress. We must use low cost (Free) methods which are readily available and develop strategies which keep the Sons of the American Revolution in the public mind on a frequent basis. The presidents of each chapter should reach out to local newspapers in the methods described below so that local citizens will come to know SAR on a higher level. To increase public awareness of SAR we must get the attention of potential members who will be the life blood of our future organization. With only 1,800 members we are barely scratching the surface of potential memberships. Below are some actions that will increase participation in our chapter meeting and add members to our rolls.

1) Each chapter should advertise their meetings in all local papers in advance of the meeting day. Most papers, especially small weekly papers, are glad to get news that is relevant to readers and does not require any work of them. For example, most papers have an events calendar which shows upcoming club meetings, speakers and community events- make sure the local SAR meeting is listed not only every local paper, but also in any outlying newspaper where members can be drawn. In the Macon area for example, meeting info can be sent to Perry, Jeffersonville, Cordele, and Fort Valley. In the Ocmulgee Chapter, our VP Jack Mauldin has run notices of our meetings and speakers in the "Macon Telegraph" and we have noticed a good increase in the numbers of guests in attendance at monthly meetings. Make sure the time, place and address of your meeting is listed, plus the contact info of the President or VP in charge of programs. The papers are usually also glad to run photos of your speakers and short captions on the speakers topic, after the event, so be sure to get those in to the papers too!

2) Don't overlook the chance to write letters to the editor on a frequent basis. When representing the SAR, your letters should of patriotic nature, advance American ideals and goals and be non political in nature, never criticizing candidates or political parties. The SAR website and GA SAR Source book have some good topics to explore. Below is general letter that can be used by every Georgia chapter, to advance new member recruitment, for your consideration.

The fact is that most people have no idea if any of their past relatives fought in the rev war. But that's not usual since that war occurred over 200 years ago. But the truth is that most US citizens have one or more rev war ancestors in their backgrounds, just waiting to be discovered!

However your own personal family history is probably no less remarkable and interesting!

Most people don't have the knowledge or training to conduct family background research .But that's where Sons of the American Revolution or Daughters of the American Revolution can be of great help! The volunteer registrars of these two groups will work with you to help you discover your own family history. Once you uncover your fascinating family history, it will be something that you'll be able to share with all your relatives. They will be both amazed and appreciative for your efforts to build a living family legacy to be passed down to future generations. Gen. William C. Westmoreland Award

Georgia Society President Allen Greenly presents the Westmoreland award to Compatriot Bill Kabel of the Piedmont Chapter for his long serving efforts in support of military veterans.

The Westmoreland Award was authorized in 1996. Only one award is presented annually to an SAR member who has distinguished himself by his service to veterans.

SAR Veterans Committee determines a winner at the Spring Leadership Conference in Louisville, Kentucky, and the award is presented at the annual SAR Congress.

Among the criteria considered in making a selection are: the number of hours volunteered for serving veterans; service on veterans committees at the chapter, state-level society, and national levels; hours and miles driven to help veterans; the number of items and cash contributions made to Veterans Services; association with other organizations that work with veterans; sponsorship of veteran events at SAR events; and accomplishments in regards to veterans programs.

The Westmoreland Award is a special gold version of the SAR's Service to Veterans Medal. An SAR member may receive this medal only once. A certificate accompanies the medal. Oak leaf clusters or other ribbon attachments are not authorized.

National Winners-Chapter Awards

Two Georgia Society Chapters earned National level distinctions in 2015.

Chapter Presidents Sid Turner of the Blue Ridge Mountains Chapter and Rick Reese with the Piedmont Chapter received certificates recognizing their chapters' efforts in the Americanism and President General competitions.

Blue Ridge Mountain Chapter was first in the nation among chapters with membership of 1-49 Compatriots on both categories. Piedmont Chapter led all Chapters with 100-199 members in Americanism and President General Streamer.

The Georgia Society earned a total of fifty Chapter recognitions in the whole range of Chapter sizes and variety of competitions.

At the National total, 2015 contests saw another record being set in terms of chapter participation. A total of 175 chapters - or 31.14% of all chapters - participated by submitting a score sheet.



Battle of Saratoga

It was said that this was the win that the American forces needed to get France to "fully" assist them in the American Revolution."


Poster Presentation

Wiregrass Chapter Sons of the American Revolution presented a framed document showing and naming the 64 Georgia Counties after Revolutionary War Patriots.





The Revolution's Last Men-The Soldiers Behind the Photographs

Don N. Hagist

In 1864, *The Last Men of the Revolution* was written by Elias Hillard. It purported to be not only the stories of these ancient warriors from the American Revolution but also included their photographs. Hillard and his photographer had visited these men, photographed them and taken down whatever the men had told them. It is a remarkable book. When I saw a copy of the old book I stared into the eyes of the veterans and considered that through those eyes were seen historic combat. Perhaps, even glimpses of legendary officers. When I turned to the text I soon became disenchanted as the history was improbable or even clearly erroneous. After the passage of so many years, and so many retellings of the tales the facts had gotten blurred and obscured. Hillard made no effort to reconcile obvious inconsistencies.




Don Hagist has brought about a miracle of sorts. He has taken the 1864 volume and has dug deep into the military careers of the *Last Men*. This is not a cursory look here and there for information but rather a

concerted and expertly conducted investigation in a wide range of primary sources. The result is utterly fascinating. The *Last Men* are revealed in detail that would astound them. An added benefit is that the narrative of the true experiences of the old soldiers takes the reader into areas and aspects of military life that may be unfamiliar territory. Therefore, besides learning about these specific individuals we also come away learning a great deal more about the life of soldiers in general than we would have expected.

To the great credit of the publisher the extensive footnotes are where they belong, at the bottom of the page. They are a must read. Not only is there valuable additional information but the sources themselves are fascinating. As one reads the footnotes one must respect and admire Hagist's research skills. Additionally, the book contains the pension applications of the old veterans as well as the narrative presented in the 1864 volume. A very unusual set of drawings have been created especially for this volume by historian and artist Eric H. Schnitzer depicting what the *Last Men* may have looked like in their youth dressed and accoutered properly for the period.

This book is unique. I highly recommend it. And, don't forget you can look into the eyes of the Last Men.



William Washington, American Light Dragoon:

A Continental Cavalry Leader in the War of Independence - Daniel Murphy

William Washington, the Revolutionary War cavalry commander, is relatively unknown. However, he played an important role in the War especially in the South, and should be recognized for his skills and accomplishments.

Virtually every written account of the military career of William Washington has been consulted in creating this book. However, what makes this book unique is "the view from the saddle." Daniel Murphy is an experienced horseman with extensive knowledge of 18th century cavalry. The book shines when tactics and such details as the complications involved in changing a charge in column of fours to line abreast are discussed. Facts such as the distance covered per second by a charging horseman gives the reader an insight into combat found nowhere else.

It is insights such as these that encourage the reader rethink just what takes place when cavalry are involved in combat. The advantages, limitations, capabilities and various uses, and misuses, of cavalry are discussed which may alter the dismounted historian's views and understanding of mounted combat.

Murphy speaks from a position of knowledge and practical experience that is refreshing. This book should find a welcome place on anyone's shelf.

The Flags They Flew...



Flag of the Second Continental Light Dragoons

Continental soldiers carried regimental banners that evoked ideals of freedom, valor, and home. This squadron flag from 1776, features a canton of thirteen "liberty stripes" and the Latin motto: "Her country calls and her sons respond in tones of thunder."

The **2nd Continental Light Dragoons**, also known as **Sheldon's Horse** after Colonel Elisha Sheldon, was commissioned by the Continental Congress on December 12, 1776 and was first mustered at **Wethersfield, Connecticut** in March 1777 for service with the **Continental Army**. The regiment consisted of four troops from Connecticut, one troop each largely from Massachusetts and New Jersey, and two companies

of light infantry. The regiment saw action at the Battle of Woodbridge, Battle of Brandywine, Battle of Kingston, Battle of Schoharie, The Battle of The Flocky (site of the first cavalry charge on American soil), Battle of Paoli, Battle of Whitemarsh, Battle of Morrisania, Battle of Saratoga, Battle of Germantown, and the Battle of Yorktown.

The unit almost never served as a whole. Usually individual troops were assigned as necessary. The regiment also performed numerous raids from whaleboats against British and Loyalist installations on Long Island. Some of the successful raids captured Fort St. George, Ft. Slongo and Lloyd's Neck, Long Island. Elements from the unit comprised Washington's personal bodyguard. In 1778, when Loyalist agents and a crack British commando team shadowed Washington for weeks with the intention of kidnapping him, they had to abandon the operation because, according to the British Intelligence Dispatches, "The 2nd Dragoons are (always) with him." The 2nd Dragoons also guarded John Andre during his incarceration, trial and subsequent execution in Nyack, New York.

The regiment's main patrol areas during the war were in Southern Connecticut and New York, where they intercepted British supplies and fought off bands of Loyalist partisans who preyed on local citizens. This duty earned them the nickname "Watchdogs of the Highlands". They also earned the sobriquet "Washington's Eyes", likely because of their spy work. Major Benjamin Tallmadge became a spy master who ran one of the most successful spy rings of the war, able to infiltrate the British military command in New York city.

On January 1, 1781, the regiment was reorganized by the dismounting of two of its six troops and re-designated the *2nd Legionary Corps*. The regiment was furloughed June 9, 1783 at Newburgh, New York and discharged on November 20, 1783 by proclamation of General Washington. The 2nd Light Dragoons are prominent in Colonel John Trumbull's paintings of the American Revolution.
