Formation & Charter Banquet of the Georgia Brigade of the "Descendants of Washington's Army at Valley Forge"

The origins of the Georgia Brigade began when Susan Gillette Meer, National Commander of the DVF, was the speaker at the Robert Forsyth Monthly Chapter meeting in November 2020. Bob Sapp was in attendance at our meeting and knowing there was probably a sufficient number of DVF members in Georgia, he started the process of forming a brigade. Bob worked with both Susan and Rick Abbott, the DVF Brigade Liaison, on the steps necessary to form a brigade. Bob subsequently sent out an Interest Inquiry email to current Georgia DVF members that generated sufficient interest to move the process forward. Bob generated and sent off the Georgia Brigade By-Laws and an Inaugural Meeting was held on April 1 where the By Laws were accepted, passed and officers elected.

On Saturday, May 22, 2021, the Georgia Brigade Charter Banquet was held at the Indian Hills Country Club where Susan Gillette Meer installed the officers and



officially chartered the Georgia Brigade of the Descendants of Washington's Army at Valley Forge.


Brenda and I attended two U.S. Daughters of 1812 events. One was the Dedication of an Historic Marker and the other was the Chartering of a new Chapter.

NSSAR Guardsmen, The National Color Guard staff cordially invites you to honor our patriot commander and join us at Mt Vernon for the annual George Washington Tomb Vigil on Saturday September 18th.

We have again been given permission to bring our weapons, under the following stipulations:

Commanders may wear their swords, all blunt edged and only removed from their sheaths when marching the guard. No other knives will be allowed. Muskets may be carried by the guard as they march and stand guard at the tomb. No powder, ball or bayonets are to be brought onto the property. There will be a safety check preformed in the parking lot before any guardsmen can move further on the property. All muskets must always be in the control of guardsmen and all additional national weapons safety rules are to be followed.

Due to the steepness of the hill from the Estate to the tomb we have decided on a long and short march for the guard. On the hour there will be a long march followed by short marches that will start near the bottom of the tomb. Please consider your ability to march up an 800ft 4 percent grade if signing up for the long march. This year the signup sheet is being handled online. Please use the following link:







Larry Whitfield is a Charter member, Past President, and Color Guard Commander of the Joseph Habersham Chapter and currently serves as a member in the Georgia Society Color Guard of the Sons of the American Revolution. For the past 14 years, Larry has also served as a member of the Habersham County Veterans Wall of Honor Committee. He is currently the committee's chairman. The Habersham County Veterans Wall of Honor was created to honor all veterans of Habersham County. Inscribed on the black granite walls are the names of more than 6,400 veterans who served during war and peacetime in all wars and conflicts from the French and Indian War of 1754 to the present. "



On November 21, 1996 The Joseph Habersham Chapter was Chartered. Georgia Governor Brian Kemp signed a Commendation that the Joseph Habersham Chapter is an important asset to the State of Georgia in promoting patriotism and carrying on the legacy of our nation's founders and celebrating their 25th Anniversary of service to the State of Georgia.

The Chapter was chartered in Habersham County, named after Colonel Joseph Habersham. Colonel Habersham was a Revolutionary War hero, Georgia Patriot, and political leader. He was a member of the Continental Congress and a Colonel in the Continental Army.

After attending Princeton he returned to Georgia to help organize the "Liberty Boys" as the Revolution approached. With other Patriots he organized the Council of Safety at Tondee's Tavern in Savannah on June 22, 1775.

He was speaker of the Georgia Assembly twice, signed the first charter granted to a state university in Georgia (the University of Georgia), was Third Postmaster General under President Washington, and for 13 years was president of the Georgia branch of the Bank of the United States.

The Joseph Habersham Chapter, composed of more than 100 members, serves, and most members reside in, the Georgia counties of Habersham, White, Rabun, Stephens, Banks, and Franklin Counties.

Many thanks go out to Joseph Habersham Chapter Compatriot President Ron Hill for leading the charge to have the chapter recognized by the State of Georgia.

<u>Lyman Hall</u>

He was educated at Yale College and served as a Minister before becoming a physician. He was one of the three Georgians who signed the Declaration of Independence.

Three years ago, the chapter hosted a ceremony to dedicate a statue of him on the grounds of the Hall County Administration building. The ceremony has been repeated on a smaller scale even through the pandemic and again this year with a simple but sincere wreath presentation.

Susan Gwaltney, Regent of the Sunbury Chapter was the surprised recipient of the NSSAR Lydia Darragh Medal at the Chapter meeting on Saturday May 1, 2021.

The Medal is named after Lydia Darragh, who crossed British lines in 1777 during the British occupation of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, to deliver information to George Washington. Being Quakers, her family did not evacuate when the British occupied Philadelphia. The British commander, General William Howe set up his headquarters across the street from the Darragh residence and later also used her house. She learned details of a planned attack and passed that information along to George Washington.



In like fashion Susan knew the contacts needed in the Barrow County School System that allowed the Lyman Hall Education Outreach team to expand their operations with their Traveling Trunk and other topics upon requests by teachers.





Based upon Benjamin Franklin's written description of the new Official Hopkinson Flag which had been translated and forwarded by the French, Jones quickly made this unconventional Ensign with the material available.



US Flag Retirement Ceremony by SAR Piedmont & Forsyth Chapter

On June 19, 2021 in Cumming, Georgia there was a US Flag Retirement Ceremony by two SAR (Sons of the American Revolution) Chapters, the Piedmont Chapter of Roswell and the Robert Forsyth Chapter of Cumming, along with the DAR (Daughters of the American Revolution) and the C.A.R. (Children of the American Revolution). Over two thousand US Flags were collected and given to the Ingram Funeral Home for proper retirement and for use at US Military Veterans Funerals.

History of the US Flag Retirement Ceremony: In 2013, Allen

Greenly (President of the Robert Forsyth Chapter in GA) and John Flikeid developed a project for the construction of a Flag Receptacle to be placed in partnering Home Depot store locations. Home Depot customers would be able to deposit worn and unserviceable flags in the Flag Receptacle. Those flags would be collected by members of the sponsoring SAR chapter, and properly disposed of in an annual Flag Retirement Ceremony at a local funeral home and crematory to be held on a weekend close to Flag Day. The sponsorship of these Flag Receptacles was also shared by local DAR, C.A.R. societies, and local Boy Scout Troops. The initial Flag Receptacle was sponsored by the Robert Forsyth Chapter, SAR, the Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter, DAR and Boy Scout Troop 1099. This flag receptacle was placed in the Cumming Home Depot on Flag Day 2013. The first year, the Robert Forsyth Chapter collected approximately 500 flags from this receptacle. Based on the success of this first receptacle, the Robert Forsyth Chapter installed a second Flag Receptacle in the Dawsonville Home Depot. This receptacle was also sponsored by the Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter, DAR and the local Dawsonville Boy Scouts.

An additional Flag Receptacle was purchased by the Atlanta Chapter and placed in a Home Depot in the Atlanta area. Based on the success of the project by the Robert Forsyth Chapter, the Piedmont Chapter decided to participate in the project beginning in August of 2015. The Piedmont Chapter was able to partner with two Home Depot store locations, one in Roswell, GA and one in Alpharetta, GA to place a Flag Receptacle in each of the two stores. The Piedmont Chapter partnered with the Martha Stewart Bulloch DAR and the Martha Stewart Bulloch Society C.A.R. to place these receptacles. The first combined Flag Retirement



Ceremony by the Robert Forsyth and Piedmont chapters occurred in June of 2016, in which approximately 1,200 worn flags were properly disposed of. The Robert Forsyth and Piedmont Chapters held a joint Flag Retirement Ceremony on June 10, 2017 where approximately 2000 worn flags were given a proper and respectful disposition. The program was an overwhelming success and both chapters are planning on adding additional Flag Receptacles.

The Flag Receptacles are made of steel, then covered with the vinyl artwork. The left shows a Minute Man with the backdrop of the American flag. The front artwork shows the American Bald Eagle coming out of an American flag. The right side shows the tail of the bald eagle and the American flag. Faded in is the photo of the soldiers raising the American flag on Iwo Jima. Receptacles have dual locks on the front door and also have four caster wheels for easy mobility. The cost of each receptacle is approximately \$1,000 and will last for years either inside or out in the weather.

The receptacles are designed to be placed in public places with lots of foot traffic. The artwork is designed to catch the eye of the public as they go about their normal routines. Home Depot stores were chosen due to their size and foot traffic. However, they can be placed in any large retail environment making them easily accessible to the public.

This program has become a huge success based on the limited receptacles in place today. What we have found is that there is a great need by the public to properly dispose of their used and worn flags. The problem is that most do not know where to take their flags for proper disposal. These receptacles provide a place for them to deposit their used and worn flags in a location that is open seven days a week.







Augusta Veteran Receives Daughters of the American Revolution's Highest Award

Wadene Welch, chapter regent, is at right. His service to active duty and military veterans has never been out of a desire to win awards, but because of his convictions.

"This caught me by surprise – a pleasant surprise," said Dr. James Brady, III, who was awarded the Daughters of the American Revolution's Medal of Honor, its highest and most prestigious award, at a luncheon May 11 at the Augusta Country Club. He knew he was in consideration for some type of award because members of the DAR had requested information from him, but he said he'd put it on the shelf and had forgotten about it. He learned a few weeks ago that he would be receiving the honor. Brady is a long-time member of the Sons of the American Revolution. "I grew up hearing all kinds of stories about my ancestors in the Revolutionary War," he said.

He had a curious mind, though, and didn't want to take the tales at face value. As he researched, he discovered the stories were steeped in fact. A native of Pennsylvania, he traced his ancestry to an Irish couple who immigrated to the colonies and whose five sons fought in the Revolutionary War. His research led to his joining of the SAR 35 years ago.

He spent 24 years in the Marine Corps and then served four years as the civilian-military operations manager in Iraq and Afghanistan from 2005-2009, "ensuring that U.S., NATO and Coalition troops received the very best care possible while deployed to combat outposts," according to a news release.

His military service brought him joy in his life, he said. "It wasn't always fun. It was never meant to be fun." But it brought fulfillment, as did spending those four years as a civilian contractor.

Brady is heavily involved in local veterans' organizations such as the Military Order of the World Wars. He spearheaded the efforts to create a Vietnam War Memorial in downtown Augusta, serving as the chair of the Vietnam War Memorial Initiative.

He has coordinated the annual Memorial Day and Veterans Day observance in downtown Augusta since 2014.

"The award is presented, once each year, to one natural-born U.S. citizen who has best exemplified the principles of leadership, patriotism, trustworthiness and service throughout their career. In order to be considered for nomination, the recipient must have made unique and lasting contributions to our American heritage by truly giving of himself or herself to his or her community, state, country and fellow man. Dr. Brady was overwhelmingly selected," according to a news release.

The Augusta Chapter of the DAR was organized Feb. 20, 1892. It's the third-oldest DAR chapter in the state of Georgia and the 19th oldest in the country.



From early April on, I have attended many zoom meetings, both personally and as the GASSAR Veterans Committee Chair. On April 27th, I presented a virtual wreath at the Arlington National Cemetery gravesite of USAF LTC Frank D. (Bruiser) Bryant, Jr., in remembrance of his courageous service and ultimate sacrifice.

On May 6, I attended the NSSAR Veterans Committee Meeting. Chairman Scott Giltner delivered a stirring tribute and thank you to retiring Compatriot Bill Kabel for his years of service to veterans. During new business, the committee approved establishment of an award for the NSSAR's outstanding state society and titled it the Herschel W. - * Another consideration is that a Zoom meeting will also permit chapter members whose health or physical constraints might not allow for them to physically attend an in-person meeting to participate in the chapter meeting on Zoom

Please consider the Outstanding Cadet Enhanced Program and the Bronze ROTC Medal Program to be totally separate programs.

SAR Silver ROTC Medals Packages mailed to NGA College, Columbus U., Savanah U., UGA (AF Det.), and GA Tech (3 medals for A, N, AF). Only GA Tech had a GASSAR Representative present at their Awards Ceremony. Chapters should report this activity on Form 10.06.0F Chapter Report to BOM and PG/Americanism Report.

I have contacted *SAR Magazine* Editor Steve Vest and we are planning articles for the Nov, Feb and May issues of magazine on the 2022 Savannah conference. If you have news items that need to be included, please send them to me as they become available. Preliminary information on available tours and grave marking event would be welcome in November, but will be mentioned in every issue to keep attendees on target. We will try to include a broad overview of this conference in the November issue to get the interest up of all our national attendees! Hoping this will be the biggest and best conference ever!

We continue to work on getting approval on the SAR park bench that will commemorate the British withdrawal from Savannah on July 11, 1782, as suggested by compatriot George Thurmond. The plan is to place a granite park bench in Battlefield Memorial Park, close to the flagpole. I was successful in getting tentative permission from the City of Savannah to place the bench in the park, but it must still go before the full city Council. We are still short of funds for the project. If each chapter would contribute 25.00 to this bench project effort, it would be greatly appreciated!

The bench will be dedicated during the 2022 SAR National Congress. Approximate cost for the bench is 2,000. Thanks to the Piedmont, Edward Telfair and Marquis Lafayette chapters and President Jessel for their donations to this important project! We are working on getting permission of the Savannah Historical Commission to place the bench on public property. We have had some problems with staff turnover, but we are working through it. Thanks to Jeff Loomis, President of the Edward Telfair Chapter in Savannah and Roger Coursey, Patriot Medals Committee, for their support.

We are making good progress on the "George Washington in Savannah 1791" painting. Artist Jeff Trexler is working on a sketch of the painting for our review. After extensive research, I determined that George Washington left his horse and carriage at nearby Mulberry Plantation and continued on to Savannah by river barge. These logistical details are often omitted from books and stories. The fact is that "Washington arrives in Savannah on a barge, guided by 8 Captains, smartly dressed with blue silk jackets, black pants and round hats. Streaming from the hats are black ribbons with the words "long live the President" in gold letters. In the right background is the ship "Thomas Wilson" flying international flags to honor Washington. The 1791 flags should be from France, Spain, the Netherlands and Sweden, who aided the US war efforts. Historical details have been supplied to the artist and I expect it to be a wonderful and highly successful painting! Thanks to our many chapters, the George Washington Endowment fund and the Georgia Fellows for funding this project!

Before I close, let me remind you that we are still on target to dedicate the Andrew Jackson SAR park bench at the Hermitage in Nashville on March 13, 2022. Thankfully, the bench is already in its proper place next to Jackson's Tomb. I think Ol' Hickory would be proud to know that, even today, we greatly appreciate his Revolutionary War service! It honors a great American President and brings positive recognition to the SAR. Thanks to our chapters, the Georgia Fellows Fund, our GASSAR leadership, Emil Decker and Tennessee SAR for their help with this project! Be sure to mark the date, March 13, 2022 on your calendar!

The winners at the National level will be awarded \$5,000.00 for First Place, \$2,500.00 for Second Place and \$1000.00 for Third Place. The National winners will officially be announced at the 2021 National Congress this summer in Renton, Washington.

The 2021-2022 Knight Essay Contest commences this calendar year with the beginning of the school year in August of 2021. Contestants enter the contest through the nearest SAR Chapter. The deadline for entries at the Chapter Level is December 1, 2021. A reminder to that effect will be sent to BOM email distribution system at that time. In the meantime, the summer is an excellent time for prospective contestants to begin research for their essays.

The contest is open to any United States citizen or legal resident enrolled in the 9th thru 12th grades during the contest period. I recently responded to an inquiry from a Compatriot who had assumed the duties of his chapter to inform The Hornet's Nest editor of the goings-on within their august group. Once written, I felt it would be a good thing to use as a part of my current quarterly report.

"Dear Compatriot;

I use most submissions that are sent in as Chapter News, since that is what it mostly represents. If you have read any recent edition, you will know what I mean. I like photos that are re-printable. Better quality obviously works best. Writeups on what the photo is about, names of those in the photo, are also appreciated. Sometimes I get a lot from some chapters, but mostly I experience a lack of content, so send stuff. Yes, even words only can sometimes be used if photos are not available. Very rarely do I get so much that I edit down submissions, but it has happened.

Reposts from Facebook, Instagram, or other venues are acceptable. A few might follow your Facebook account, but more people see them if shared in multiple venues. Photos of newspaper clippings don't tend to reprint well.

Often a submission, like attending / participating in a State or National Event is included in that section of the newsletter instead of in the designated Chapter section.

I have occasionally found a superb submission that cries out to be, what I call, a stand-alone or special article. Sort of like the lead article for each issue. You will usually see these with the light blue background.

I accept submissions anytime. I amass them and add to the next edition as time permits. A last-minute flurry of submissions at the end of a quarter is inevitable, but better last minute than no submission at all.

Items are posted for the quarter they represent, with the occasional exception that something was missed: Something like a missed deadline. Each quarter ends on the 3rd month. (Guess that's why they call it quarterly). End of March, June, Sep, & Dec. By that time, most of the edition is written. Just have to add in the last-minute submissions, mostly Officer or Committee reports. These are late usually because it takes them time to collect and collate the info. Two weeks should be sufficient. I try to proof and publish before the following BOM meeting. Then, of course, I receive a few reports that don't make the deadline or the edition. Please make the deadline.

And please, let your members know when the next edition gets published. I put out a notice via the BOM and Color Guard Distribution Lists. That about covers it, unless you have a question. And thanks. Your email allows me to do double duty and use this as MY REPORT, due at the end of Jun."

I won't be in attendance at the next BOM due to a conflict in scheduling. Please read, heed, & submit indeed.
