The Georgia Society SAR endured a sudden and shocking loss just a couple days after the end of our 132nd National Congress, which we hosted in Savannah this past July. The untimely loss of our beloved President Joseph Vancura to a fatal aneurysm brought on by Covid-19. Thus, I never imagined that I

would be writing this "President's Dispatch" as soon as I would be.

We began our postponed Summer BOM this year with a Moment of Silence in honor of President Vancura.

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Tribute to a President, Compatriot, and Friend

Joseph "Joe" Lawrence Vancura, Jr of Marietta, Georgia passed away suddenly at his home on Sunday evening, July 17, 2022. He had just returned from successfully leading the 132nd national convention of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) which was held in Savannah the previous

week. In addition to his leadership role as the GASSAR State President, he served many other positions both at the state level and at the chapter level. Mr. Vancura was a Chapter Charter Member of Captain John Collins and a Life member of the National Society.

Joe was a man with varied interests and accomplishments. He graduated from Florida State University in 1994 with a BS degree in Finance.

He then attended the University of Georgia's Terry College of Business where he graduated in 1995 with an M.B.A. and after considering the relationship between finance and law, Joe pursued a law degree and graduated from the University of Georgia's School of Law with a Juris Doctor where Banking, Corporate Finance and Securities were his primary interests.

He passed the state bar in 1999 and then used his academic background, knowledge, experience, and natural leadership skills to become the Director of Accounting, Human Resources and

My presentations on "Colonial and Revolutionary Art" at various chapters across the state this past year, as well as at the National Congress, continue to give me welcome opportunities to meet, get to know, and be impressed by so many of our fine Compatriots—brothers and sisters alike, devoted to the cause of Patriotism--and gratitude—for the United States of America. His love for his dog and particularly his kitties was often demonstrated through personal conversations, but most of all, his love for his mother Kathy and sister Betsy came first.

That first Thursday evening, we of the Georgia Society met together and broke bread, even drank a little wine, and supped together as a group at the Mi Casita on Fourth—an appropriate start to our busy meeting schedule.

I am also writing the current Georgia Society Quarterly Report for the South Atlantic District Presidents Organization, because, just two weeks after Leadership, I will be meeting with them again during the King's Mountain Event. At King's Mountain, S.C., I will of course be involved in several events, on behalf of the Georgia and National Societies. (Not to mention, countless Zoom meetings.) All leading up to our next BOM Meeting on November 5th, and the glorious Ft. Morris "Come & Take It" NSSAR celebration on November 19th, which will include PG Bruce Pickette! The Georgia Society SAR will have carried on--having experienced both the most difficult of trials and the best of rewards that life, and our Freedom, have to offer!






132ND CONGRESS

Members of the Georgia Society BOM email distribution list received encouraging updates throughout the Congress from our President. I found these uplifting and helped me hype up for the coming day. I thought it would be an appropriate homage to the Late President of the Georgia Society as we cover the Congress held in Savannah. [Editor]







Left: Just down from the Congress Hotel were the Washington Guns. The marker reads: These bronze cannon were presented to the Chatham Artillery by President Washington after his visit to Savannah in 1791. Of English and French make, respectively, they are excellent examples of the art

of ordnance manufacture in the 18th century. An inscription on the British 6 pounder states that it was "surrendered by the capitulation of York Town Oct. 19, 1781." The English cannon was cast in 1758 during the reign of George II and the royal insignia and motto of the Order of the Garter appear on its barrel. The French gun was manufactured at Strasburg in 1756. On its elaborately engraved barrel appear the coat of arms of Louis XIV: the sun which was the emblem of that monarch, and a Latin inscription (which Louis XIV first ordered placed on French cannon) meaning "Last Argument of Kings." The dolphins were emblematic of the Dauphin of France. The gun was individually named "La Populaire." Reminders of America's hard-won struggle for Independence and of the great man who led the Continental forces in the Revolution, the historic "Washington Guns" were placed on public display here through co-operation of the Chatham Artillery and the City of Savannah.














On this day in history, July 11, 1782, the British evacuate Gavannah, Georgia as the American Revolution comes to a close. Georgia was the site of many bloody battles during the war, many between patriots and Loyalists who were their neighbors or brothers.

Georgia saw its first British troops in early 1776 when a fleet of British ships arrived at the mouth of the Savannah River to buy rice for the British troops which were then blockaded in Boston. Georgia patriots resisted the efforts to buy rice and the Battle of the Riceboats ensued. During the affair, Georgia's Royal Governor, James Wright, was taken captive. Wright eventually escaped and fled the colony with the British and their confiscated rice.

For the next two years, Georgia remained relatively peaceful and a provincial government developed. The entrance of France into the war in 1778 changed things for Georgia, however. England was forced to remove some troops from the northern colonies to send to defend British possessions in the West Indies. A new strategy was developed to take back the southern colonies based on the belief that there were large numbers of Loyalists in the south who would support the effort. Gavannah was the first target and it was easily captured on December 29, 1778 by British Lieutenant Colonel Archibald Campbell.

The rest of the colony fell quickly, though the militia continually gave the British trouble. Governor Wright returned in July of 1779 and re-established the royal government, the only colony to have lost its royal government and then re-establish it. In September of 1779, a joint American/French attempt to retake Savannah failed with massive casualties to the French and Americans.

In December of 1780, after several large defeats in the south, the Continental Congress appointed General Nathanael Greene the new head over the Continental Army's southern department. Greene's leadership and skill quickly subdued the south. By the summer of 1782, the British had abandoned all of Georgia except for Gavannah.

The surrender of General Charles Cornwallis at Yorktown finally persuaded Parliament to end the war. As peace negotiations proceeded, the British began evacuating troops from the colonies. Orders arrived from New York on June 14 to abandon Georgia for good. Governor Wright was furious as General Alured Clarke made preparations to evacuate Gavannah. Troops began leaving the city on July 11, headed to New York, St. Augustine and the West Indies. Governor Wright and other officials fled to Charleston.

Later that evening, Lieutenant Colonel James Jackson of the Georgia Legion marched into Savannah to reclaim their capital city. The Georgia House of Assembly met in Savannah on the 13th and took control of Georgia once and for all.

Tuesday July 12, 2022- Good morning from Savannah! Georgia compatriots,

Here is to the kick off of a great Congress!

The Memorial Service was beautiful. When you are able to remember our past compatriots in an historic setting such as The St. John's Church, it means something even more special. I will be sure to share some photos before too long.

Last night we had wonderful young people giving their final historical Oration for the Rumbaugh contest. That winner will be announced today during the Youth Awards Luncheon. This luncheon is always sold out and well attended. I think we all take pride knowing that the future of our organization, and of our country, is in such capable, informed young hands.

Opening session today begins at 9am, with welcomes from guests and dignitaries. Usually that runs about an hour or so, maybe less. Then after a quick coffee break we will get into the morning business. After the Youth Awards lunch we will continue with afternoon session, where we will dive into the officer and committee reports further. Think of the BOM reporting process, but on a much larger scale. There will be some motions made and debates held, and the business of the SAR will continue along. Parliamentary procedure at work!

Tonight after dinner on your own, we gather for a great event. First we will begin with a ceremony to recognize six new Minutemen. The Minuteman is the highest award given by the SAR, given for long, faithful and outstanding service to the National Society. Only six compatriots receive this award every year. There will be a procession of prior Minutemen, introduced by class year, who will remain on the stage to welcome the newest compatriots to their ranks. Following that service, we will move into Recognition Night, where individual, chapter, and state awards are handed out. It is my honor as GASSAR President to receive these awards on behalf of our winners, and then present them at the July BOM next week.

Thursday July 14, 2022 - Good morning from Savannah! Happy (sleepy) Thursday,

Well, just one more day to go. Last night we held the President General's banquet, where we honored and congratulated our general officers on a year well-served. The keynote speaker was Dr. John Derden, Professor Emeritus of History at East Georgia State College. Dr. Derden's topic was "It Started at a Bar." (The fight in Georgia, that is!) 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






The George Washington Ring



The most valuable property owned by the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution is not its Headquarters property nor even its Endowment Fund. It is a small circular object, about seven-eighths of an inch in diameter, which rests in darkness, untouched for three-hundred sixty-four days of the year, emerging for only one night annually when a new President General is installed. It shares its space in a safety deposit box with the deed to the SAR Headquarters building, an insurance policy, some stock certificates, and an affidavit about the ring's own origins. The affidavit state's, "The Seal Ring of gold set with carnelian cut with the coat of arms of General Washington, that accompanies this statement belonged to and was worn by General Washington."



This ring was donated to the SAR when SAR PG Messmore Kendall, died in 1959. The ring included an affidavit purported to verify its authenticity, signed by William Lanier Washington, a descendant of the country's first president.

Another ring, similar but slightly different, is claimed to be George Washington's ring, and is also known to exist. It was donated by the William Randolph Hearst family to Mount Vernon. Could Washington have had two of them?

There is no proof that George Washington ever used a seal ring and there is no proof that William Lanier Washington's item is authentic. Occasionally there is a skeptic who questions its authenticity, despite the affidavit of William Lanier Washington and the great care given by the SAR to the ring since it was originally presented to the SAR.

The ring itself is gold, with a thin band bearing a delicate shank. It is a perfect size ten on a modern mandrel. There is no maker's mark or any inscription whatsoever on the inside. On each outer surface, the metal of the side is deeply incised to give in raised relief a stem, three leaves, and a three-part bud or flower at the top, too worn to identify. The annulus of the crown is oval, surrounding and holding in place a light orange carnelian in which is incised the Washington crest: a shield with three stars at the top and two transverse bands beneath; surmounted by a crown containing a griffin; underlain by a ribbon bearing the Latin words "Exitus acta probat." These words come from line Eighty Five of the second Heroides of Ovid, and are translated literally as "The outcome proves the deed." A common variation is rendered "The end justifies the means."

A seal made using the Washington ring would show the griffin facing left and the words of the motto read properly from left to right. The original Washington crest, done in colored glass, can be seen in a window of what is now the buttery at Sulgrave Manor, Northamptonshire, England, a mid-16th century Tudor hall house built by Lawrence Washington, the great-great-great-great-grandfather of George Washington.

In the spring of 2000, President General Howard Horne (1999-2000, 2001) contacted Balfour,

to see if the company could make an exact replica of the ring. He was referred to a company called Creative Molding, located in North Attleboro.

President General Bill Gist (1995-1996) picked up the ring at the bank, put the artifact in his pocket, and flew to North Attleboro. Gist said many times that he was scared to death something would happen to the ring while it was in his possession. Fortunately, nothing did.

The Creative Molding employees took measurements, created a mold, and generally did everything necessary to replicate Washington's ring. The company determined they could not cut the stone in its facility, however, if Creative Molding was to proceed, it would have to contract a company in Germany to cut the stone and then make the appropriate carving. The German company prepared twenty stones and shipped these to Creative Molding. In February 2001, ten rings were shipped to the SAR Headquarters with another ten held in stock should additional rings be needed in the future. The first ten cost \$1,200 apiece. Presidents General Gist, Horne, Russ Page (1998-1999), and Bruce Butler (2000-2001) received the first four rings. The SAR ordered the additional ten when Roland Downing was President General from 2005 to 2006, and these cost nearly \$2,000 apiece. Each President General personally pays the cost of his replica Washington seal ring.

If the SAR requests additional rings in the future, Creative Molding will have to start from their mold and have new stones carved. The replica of the Washington seal ring is presented to the incoming SAR President General after he has had the original Washington seal ring on his finger for a brief few minutes during his installation.

All living Presidents General are now permitted to purchase copies of the seal ring. These copies are not replicas as they are purposely made different in several respects from the original. Sardonyx, a much darker and more opaque stone than the original orange carnelian, is used for the seal. There are variations in the gold work and in the carving of the seal. On President General Horne's copy, the gold work is not as deeply sculptured and the oval seal is smaller and darker. The griffin has a serpent's tongue and streamlined wings on Horne's ring. There is no possibility of confusing a copy with the original. Additionally, for each ring Creative Molding has replicated, the company also makes a seal ring box in which the ring is stored for the Presidents General.





Nathan Brownson served as a Surgeon, as a Deputy - Surgeon -General for Southern hospitals, and as a Captain in the Georgia Troops. He was a member of the Provincial Congress and served as Governor of Georgia. Nathan is buried at Midway Cemetery.

In 1784, Andrew Walthour was certified as a refugee soldier by Colonel John Baker. He was a rice planter along the coast and later established Walthourville. Andrew is buried at Midway Cemetery.

Moses Allen was commissioned Captain and Chaplain in the Georgia Continental Line in 1778. He fought at Alligator Creek on the Third Florida Expedition, 1778, at Bulltown Swamp, 1778, and Spencer's Hill (Midway), 1778. Moses was captured at Savannah in 1778 but not paroled to Sunbury with other Continental officers due to his "influential preaching and patriotic example." He was placed on the prison ship, "Nancy" in the Savannah Harbor and drowned while attempting to escape in 1779.

Thomas Stevens served as a private in the Georgia Troops. Thomas is buried at Midway Cemetery.

Lazarus Mallard was born in 1748, in Dorchester County, SC. It is unknown when Lazarus moved to Midway, but, he received a land grant for 100 acres in St. John Parish. A grant of 100 acres implies that he was unmarried at the time.

Lazarus Mallard served as Private in the St. John's Riflemen, part of the Georgia Militia, under the command of Colonel John Baker. May 1776, their name was changed to Liberty County Militia. He was certified as a "refugee" soldier (fought in South Carolina) by Colonel John Baker on March 22, 1784; and received Warrant #1306 for 100 acres in Goshen, Georgia.

Lazarus was active in the Midway Congregational Church, including service as a Deacon from 1896 until his death on March 12, 1814, and was buried in Midway Congregational Church Cemetery on Row B, Grave 14.

Inscription on tombstone reads: "Sacred to the memory of LAZARUS MALLARD, born in SC, died in Midway, GA in the 66 year of his age. His natural disposition was benevolent and cheerful; not prone to give offense, unapt to be offensive. In deportment, courteous and social, generous and just. Of understanding, prompt and respectful. What he possessed, he enjoyed; what he enjoyed, he imparted; his house was the stranger's home. His piety by which he adorned the office of Deacon, was active, enlightened and sincere."


BLAST FROM THE PAST

"Blast from the Past", looks at some back issue / historic news relevant to the Georgia Society, Sons of the American Revolution. Looking back to July - September, 2005, with George Thurmond as editor, Compatriot Ted Spangler wrote about John Stark.

John Stark The Hero of The Rail Fence

A renowned hero of the French and Indian War, John Stark stepped forward again to serve during the American Revolution. Stark is perhaps best known for his successful rout of British General John Burgoyne during the Battle of Bennington. Two years before this infamous battle, however, Stark played an integral part in the Battle of Bunker Hill.




On June 16, 1775, over one thousand men marched to the Charlestown Neck Peninsula near Boston. American General Artemis Ward ordered the fortification of Bunker Hill, a flat-topped knoll on the north end of the peninsula. Sometime later, field commanders William Prescott and Israel Putnam reached a decision to fortify Breed's Hill on the south end first. Their men worked through the night to build an earthwork bastion. As the sun rose, British ships anchored in Boston Harbor saw the newlyconstructed fort. The British quickly planned a four-sided attack to cut Breed's Hill off from both reinforcements and retreat.

With the battle imminent, Putnam was able to petition General Ward for additional soldiers. Colonel John Stark of the New Hampshire regiment arrived with two hundred fresh troops. As he surveyed the scene, Stark recognized a serious flaw in the American defense. A small area of beach was unsecured. He saw that an enemy column could advance unseen until it was behind American lines. Stark sent his men to build a stone wall in the sand. British General Sir William Howe planned a head-on attack on the strip of beach protected by John Stark and his men. Howe did not believe the American defense could stand up against a massive attack. The British marched four abreast toward the wall where Stark's men were lined up in three rows.

Waiting until the British infantry reached a marked location fifty yards away, the Americans began firing into the advancing troops. Row one dropped back to reload as the second round of American soldiers fired into the advancing enemy. Howe and his men retreated briefly before initiating a second identical attack. Again, the British were soundly pushed back. After a third similar attack, the British withdrew, leaving ninety-six dead on the narrow beach.

Howe regrouped. He planned his next attack toward a fortified rail fence just above Stark's line. This time, however, the British soldiers halted suddenly and opened fire. Stark commanded his men to fire on the fixed targets. Once again, Howe's men were pushed back. A final attack was initiated using fresh British troops. The British plan was to hold John Stark in place. Both sides exchanged fire and held their positions. Meanwhile, other British troops took over the fort as the Americans ran out of ammunition. Stark stayed in position until it was clear that Breed's Hill had fallen. Stark and his men continued to direct fire as they dropped back in a slow retreat. These men were credited with providing steady cover as the colonial troops withdrew to Bunker Hill.

For his part in the Battle of Bunker Hill, John Stark was promoted to colonel. Initially hailed as a horrible defeat for the Americans, this battle was gradually seen as a kind of victory. The Battle of Breed's Hill showed the Americans that, with additional planning and organization, the British Army could be defeated. Freedom from English rule was attainable.



He became widely known as the "Hero of Bennington" for his exemplary service at the Battle of Bennington in 1777.

It has been said that of all the Revolutionary War generals, Stark was the only real Cincinnatus because he truly retired from public life at the end of the war.

In 1809, a group of Bennington veterans gathered to commemorate the battle of Bennington. General Stark, then aged 81, was not well enough to travel, but he sent a letter to his comrades, which closed "Live free or die: Death is not the worst of evils." The motto "Live Free or Die" became the New Hampshire state motto in 1945.





What's With the Black Powder Shortage?


You may have noticed that firearms, ammunition, and some accessories have become harder to come by. This is a direct result of supply shortages, shipping

problems, and panic buying. Our semi-annual planned black powder purchase has run afoul of this predicament, as many of you may have already realized. Some stores in certain areas around the country may have powder, while others do not, or even will not carry it. Those that have some powder may be pricing it much higher than in previous years.

After investigating, I found that our mutually agreed upon supply-chain observations were not entirely to blame however. After nearly 220 years, the last black powder manufacturer in America **CLOSED ITS DOORS!** Hodgdon Powder Company, the owner of GOEX, announced the immediate closure of its Camp Minden, Louisiana facility in a statement on Sept. 28, 2021.

"Effective immediately, Hodgdon Powder Company, Inc. has decided to cease manufacturing operations at the company's Camp Minden, Louisiana site while evaluating strategic options for the black powder business," Hodgdon stated in its release. "The business will wind down operations while an evaluation process on the future of the black powder business takes place."

On June 18, 2021, a fire broke out at the GOEX Camp Minden facility. While no one was injured, it may have played a role in Hodgdon's decision. Black powder is extremely dangerous to manufacture, which causes endless liability issues for the company. Some aspiring DIY-ers make powder themselves, but it is indeed a dangerous endeavor. *YouTube at your own risk!*



"Strategic options for the GOEX and Olde Eynsford brands of black powder, along with the manufacturing capabilities, will include a potential sale of the business," the release said. "All affected employees will be retained through Dec. 31, 2021, to assist in an orderly closing of the site and receive severance commensurate with their years of service to the company."

In 1802, DuPont opened its original US black powder facility in Delaware along the Brandywine River. By 1912 the need for black powder had grown, and DuPont opened another production plant in Berlin, Pennsylvania.

The Berlin plant supplied black powder for the US Military from WWI through Vietnam. Yes, as late as the Vietnam era, field artillery shells used black powder for their ignition systems. Smokeless powder being the primary gunpowder for cartridges during these years, it seems many artillery shells and aerial bombs still relied on black powder in their ignition systems. The US Army procured over 8 million pounds of black powder from 1967-1968.



In the 1970s, the Berlin plant became part of GOEX. In 1997, GOEX manufacturing was moved to an Army-owned facility in Minden, Louisiana. Camp Minden has a long history of military munitions manufacturing that lasted from 1942 to 1994.

Hodgdon Powder Company purchased GOEX on Jan. 1, 2009, and made it a point to update the black - powder manufacturing process, making it safer for employees and improving the quality of the product.

Schutzen Powder, a traditional black powder, is still imported into the US, but in very limited quantities. The most common imported brand of black powder found on American shelves is Swiss Black Powder, made by Schuetzen Powder Energetics, Inc.

Now you see why demand outweighs supply, making black powder harder and harder to find. But all is not lost. It turns out the 220-year history of GOEX making black powder in the United States has not ended after all, as it has merely suffered a temporary production gap. Estes Energetics of Penrose, Colorado, confirmed in an early 2022 release that its rumored purchase of the GOEX black powder brand and production plant has indeed been completed. On Jan. 31, Estes announced it has

acquired GOEX from Hodgdon, along with the Old Eynsford black powder brand, also produced at the Minden plant.

IF you were, or still are, a model rocket fan, (I was an avid, but poor model rocketeer in the late 60's – early 70's), you may recognize Estes as the manufacturer of rocket kits, and multiple sizes of model rocket engines. The release states, "GOEX black powder also propels the model rocket motors of sister company Estes Industries, the leading model rocket brand, and supports the needs of the US Military."


So when can customers expect to see the familiar red and black GOEX containers on store shelves and website inventories again? Unfortunately, there will still be a bit of a wait. You can expect to see new GOEX and Olde Eynsford cans in the fourth quarter of 2022, or perhaps the first quarter of 2023. Estes has informed distributors that there will be no change in product.

Even though there has been a bit of a wait, an American company will once again make black powder for all the hunters, sports shooters, reenactors, and Color Guards.

William Wiggins, Jr and his father both signed the Georgia Declaration of Independence Petition for the Continental Congress held in Philadelphia on July 5, 1777, while living in the newly formed Wilkes County, Ga. William, Jr was granted Bounty Land of more than 800 acres in Washington and Wilkes Counties in Georgia for his services in the Georgia Line under Gen Nathaniel Greene.

Pictured with Jack and Rod Dugger at Rod's induction are Rod's daughter, April Penton, and Tallahassee Chapter President and Registrar, Don Wilham.

During WWII, Rod served in the US Navy in the European Theater of Operations. At 102-years-old Rod is certainly the oldest Compatriot inducted into the Blue Ridge Mountains Chapter and possibly the oldest compatriot inducted into the Georgia Society.

The batting, the filler, is the center of the quilt, its warmth. It represents our hope that this quilt will bring warmth, comfort, peace, and healing to the individual who receives it. The backing is the strength that supports the other layers. It represents the strength of the recipient, the support of his or her family, our communities, and our nation. each stitch that holds the layers together represents love, gratitude, and sometimes the tears of the maker.

Over 300,000 quilts have been made in the USA by both men and women to help comfort our Veterans.

The Blue Ridge Mountains Chapter was chartered April 1, 2000 as a chapter of the Georgia SAR Society and Nationally recognized in the top five chapters of over 600 chapters worldwide, as being one of the most active SAR chapters, even though it has a small membership totaling 38 individuals.



A lot of the Continental Army's enlistments were up this month, but because of the great victory, it boasted the morale and most of the soldiers re-enlisted and new recruits were attracted to the ranks."

Left: The Fall Line Chapter held its September meeting, at the Chamber of Commerce in Sandersville. Mike Lisenby's presented the "Battle of Sullivan's Island". Charleston's artillerymen repelled a powerful British Royal Navy Squadron on the 28 June 1776. The Royal Navy had 274 cannons and 2 mortars mounted on 10 British warships and

30 transports carrying 2,500 troops. The British Navy was under Commodore Sir Peter Parker and British troops were commanded by Major-General Sir Henry Clinton. The American forces had 6,500 troops commanded by Colonel William Moultrie. During the battle, the fort was struck by several thousand cannon balls, but the palmetto trunks used in the structure absorbed the shock of the strikes and the fort's structure remained intact. The American gunners were

protected by the sixteen foot - thick sand and timber walls and suffered few casualties. American's casualties were 17 dead and 20 wounded. 7,000 British cannon balls were collected on Sullivan's Island after the battle.











Compatriot Derden also stressed the importance of Georgia's role in the Revolution and pointed to the increasing emphasis by modern historians of the broader significance of the Southern campaigns in the eventual Patriot triumph at Yorktown in 1781."



It was a very SPECIAL DAY!

Many thanks to these GASSAR members who participated in this important event- Scott Collins, Thomas Miller, Bill Fuqua, Ken Smith, Allen Greenley, Chuck Garnett, Gary Smith, Edwin Hendricks, John Trussell, Bill Summers, Don Loudermilk, Ed Trust and Bill Daniel. Much work was done in preparation for the Savannah National Sar Congress. Many hundreds of hours of work were donated by your 2022 Georgia SAR Congress committee. Our hats should be off in salute to these many GASSAR members!

After much effort, I was able to locate a company that was willing and able to complete our order for a SAR Park bench in Tricentennial Park. Soon thereafter, the Congress planning committee decided to place a second bench, commemorating the 250th anniversary of the birth of the USA in another Savannah location. We decided to place the second bench in Johnson Square which has deep Revolutionary roots. The Nathaniel Green monument is located there, plus a marker about Washington's 1791 visit. It is also next to Christ Church, where Washington attended services before he departed. These benches are a long-lasting legacy of our Congress and will provide great publicity for the SAR in the future years.

The bench projects required the approval of the Savannah Metropolitan Planning Commission and the Savannah City Council with many hours of work on applications, phone calls and hearings. It required a trip to Savannah and site prep to pick the locations and identify underground utilities. Thanks to Savannah area compatriots Robert Vinyard, Jeff Loomis, Lamar Davis, Paul Lester and Roger Coursey for their valuable assistance!

I wrote three 1,750 word articles about Savannah and the upcoming Congress for *SAR Magazine*. Hopefully these articles increased the interest and excitement for the Congress. It must have worked because we had the largest turnout **EVER** for a National Congress, due to the hard work of our planning committee and the strong support of our Georgia Chapters! Also, thanks to Paul Callanan for review of the articles and valuable input! I also wrote an article for *SAR Magazine* about "George Washington Slept Here "dealing with the facts surrounding his 1791 visit to Savannah. Lamar Davis also wrote a great story about the "*Siege of Savannah*". Thanks Lamar!

Four Proclamations were prepared for Savannah leaders to deliver at our Congress proceedings, including the Mayor, the County Commission Chairman and Governor Kemp. Thanks to George Thurmond, Bill Dobbs and the Governor's office for their assistance with this process!

A 1,500-word, one act play, "George Washington in Savannah 1791" was delivered by our own Dan McMichael at the Sar President General's Banquet. Dan did an excellent job acting as George Washington which was much appreciated by the attendees. Thanks to Paul Callanan, Mike Tomme, Alan Greenly, Roger Coursey and the entire Congress planning committee for their support of this presentation. You may see this one act play as a short chapter in a future book I'm writing about Washington's visit to Savannah and other locations in Georgia. The play is copyrighted but will be made available to any non-profit theater group who wishes to present it and promote patriotic ideals.

I did an interview with a writer for *South Magazine* on our Congress which was a big plus for our PR efforts, as it reached a wide audience. Thanks to Bill Dobbs for his assistance with this project! An interview with a writer with the Savannah's Morning News resulted in a front page photo and short story in the newspaper. This was great publicity for us to the people of Savannah!

While in Savannah, I arranged to deliver "George Washington in Savannah 1791" prints to The Coastal Heritage Society, The Savannah History Museum, and The Georgia Historical Society. A donation to Savannah City Hall is still pending for the near future, to be arranged by Bob Vinyard. These donations will leave a long-lasting legacy of our Sar Congress in Savannah.

The "George Washington in Savannah 1791" painting and prints was a big success! I worked on this project for several years and it is a "one of a kind" historically correct painting that will continue to provide funds and great publicity for National and Georgia SAR! I wrote a one-page historical background on the painting with George Washington's photo and signature that will be given with each print. Thanks to the Congress Planning Committee, all Georgia Sar members and chapters for their strong support of this project!

Moving to another topic of interest to our members, I arranged with artist Jeff Trexler to get a high-quality digital image of his Kettle Creek print. President Ludley and our executive committee have approved a plan to make prints available to our members on a prepaid basis so we can order just the number we need, so get your checks to Scott Collins by November 5th or bring checks to the Nov 5 Bom meeting. You can mail checks to Scott Collins, PO Box, 709, Athens, Ga. 30603-0709. Make a notation on the check that it's for the Kettle creek print. The prints will be on high quality 3m card stock paper, similar to the George Washington prints and the same medium size, 16x24. These are prints that are titled at the bottom with the artist name, but not artist signed or numbered. They are an excellent historical depiction of the Battle of Kettle Creek that you will be proud to own. The cost is 75.00 each- make checks payable to "Ga Society SAR". Thanks to Water Chewning and the Kettle Creek Battlefield Association for their support of this project. Also, thanks to GASSAR treasurer Scott Collins for his extra efforts to collect these print fees.

It started in Georgia with the Georgia Society, SAR, but is spreading across the USA due to your strong support! I have received information and a tutorial from GASSAR Veterans Committee Chairman Scott Giltner regarding the VA's new Compassionate Contact Corps. This information has been distributed to the BOM Distribution List.

The closing date for wreath orders is November 29, 2022. Wreaths Across America Day will be observed on December 17, 2022.

When a GASSAR member or chapter references our Group ID and orders two wreaths, a complimentary third wreath will accompany their shipment. For example, if a chapter orders eight wreaths at \$15 per wreath the order total will be \$120 and 12 wreaths will be shipped to the designated cemetery.

The Marietta National Cemetery is the default shipping destination for wreaths. However, individuals and chapters have the option to specify any other qualifying cemetery in Georgia or out of state (such as Arlington National Cemetery).

When you begin filling the alternative cemetery field an auto fill feature should drop in the full cemetery name and code. There may be a slight delay as the program searches its cemetery database.

If you experience any difficulty placing your order please call WAA Liaison Richelle Bergson at 1-207-618-5348.

The Georgia Society is very highly ranked nationally for its participation in Wreaths Across America. Any individual or chapter ordering four wreaths will pay \$60 and the designated cemetery will receive six wreaths. The \$60 donation surpasses the 50 point minimum necessary for a chapter to become a Stark Award Participant.

This is a win-win opportunity. Supporting Wreaths Across America is an ideal way for a chapter to become a Stark Participant, and visiting a National or other Cemetery where veterans' gravesites have been adorned with wreaths is an unforgettable experience.

You will be notified when planning is completed for Wreaths Across America Day on December 17. In the meantime, best wishes for the success of your efforts to honor our nation's veterans.

All chapters sponsoring JROTC Units should encourage their Units to participate in the Enhanced JROTC (Outstanding Cadet Essay Contest) Program for 2022-2023. OC Nominating Packages need to be sent to me by COB 2 December 2022. *If I can assist you in this regard, please contact me.* On 31 Aug 2022, by email, I disseminate guidance and directions to all GASSAR Chapters on how to submit a strong OC Nomination Package. Chapters can purchase an Chapter OC Medal at the NSSAR Store.

SAR Silver ROTC Medals Packages have been purchased by GASSAR. Chapters that presented these awards should report this activity on Form 10.06.0F Chapter Report to BOM and PG/Americanism Report. Chapters should not purchase Silver ROTC Medals, this is done by GASSAR.

Every SMI in your AO should know the name of the JROTC POC (Point of Contact) within your chapter. Chapters need to purchase SAR Bronze in support of JROTC Units located in their AO (Area of Operations). Chapters normally presented Bronze ROTC Medals to JROTC Units in the Spring. Recipients are selected for this medal by the Senior Military Instructor (SMI). Chapters should report these presentations on Form 10.06.0F Report to BOM & PG/Americanism Rpt.

The Georgia Society SAR supports three DOD (overseas) JROTC Units (Kadena HS Okinawa Japan, Vicenza HS Italy, and Shape HS Belgium – Shape HS.





Upon returning home, the evil virus, fully activated and now began to do its evil work.


